Description

Shakespeare-in-the-Schools

Judith, Shakespeare's youngest daughter, is haunted by the ghosts of her father's characters. Accompanied by her faithful sidekick, Yorick, Jude seeks to uncover the hidden threads connecting her to the women of her father's work. On the way, she discovers lovers, warriors, dreamers, and artists, and perhaps a startling truth about herself.

Objectives

Students will receive an introduction to the dramatic world inspired by the work of Shakespeare. They will learn about adaptation of classic works into new works.

Meet the Artists

Shakespeare-in-the-Schools (SITS) is the touring outreach program of the Department of Theatre Arts at the University of Pittsburgh.

SITS educates, engages and entertains students and teachers throughout the tri-state region with touring shows of Shakespeare and other classic works, artist residencies, teacher workshops, and school matinees.

Discussion Prompts & Activities

Here is some information to get your students thinking about adaptation:

- Camels developed a third, see-through eyelid to help them protect their eyes, but still be able to see during sandstorms. The camels adapted to their environment.
- The film, Snow White and the Huntsman, is an adaptation of the Grimm Brothers' story, Little Snow White.
- The definition of adaptation, according to the Oxford English Dictionary, is "the action or process of adapting one thing to fit with another, or suit specified conditions, [especially] a new or changed environment."


Her Hamlet is an adaptation of Hamlet.

Two Adapatations of Judith Shakespeare



Creative teaching. Lifelong learning.

If we don't know much about Shakespeare, we know even less about his daughter. Here's what we know about Judith.

Judith Shakespeare, Shakespeare's youngest daughter, was born in 1585. She had a twin brother named Hamnet. He died at age eleven. Judith married Thomas Quiney in Stratford in 1616, the year of her father's death. Her father disapproved of Quiney and removed Judith from his will. She had three children, the first of which she named Shakespeare.

Two fictitious Judith Shakespeares come to life through art. Writer Virginia Woolf imagines Shakespeare's sister and names her Judith (The playwright had a few sisters in real life, but only one lived a full life; her name was Joan. The others died young). The creators of *Her Hamlet* dreamed up their Judith Shakespeare, "Shakespeare's upstart crow of a younger untwined daughter."

Think honestly: Did you know Shakespeare had a daughter? Does this knowledge change anything for you- about how you feel about Shakespeare as an icon, or how you read one of his plays?
