





Sometimes the board gets a little silly, goofy in our board chat, so here are some of my favorite quotes pulled out of contex...




Live, Love, Frozen Jr.

A stage manager will be faced with many challenges over the course of their career. While I am early in my career, I definitely have faced some challenges already. By far, my biggest has been helping execute the 24-hour musical Frozen Jr. This show was both a huge collaborative effort and a huge undertaking. We were managing a combination of all three student clubs on campus which culminated in a cast of approximately 70 and a crew and production team of approximately 25. This was, by far, the largest team I have ever worked with. On top of a massive team, we had to figure out how to teach the entire cast all the music, choreography, and blocking and help facilitate each crew area in their preparations in the span of 24 hours. This was an experience filled with teamwork, stress, learning, caffeine, pure dedication, and a ton of fun. Frozen Jr absolutely exemplified the importance of teamwork and flexibility, as we were constantly working to fit in as much as possible and organize the schedule, so people were working most efficiently.

For most of the weekend we had 2-3 rehearsal rooms running and everyone was dedicated to learning everything they could in such a short amount of time. For me personally, this also became a stressful ordeal, as all my typical jobs as a stage manager got condensed into significantly less time with significantly more people involved. I had to be able to lead a room of nearly 100 when it came time for our dress rehearsal, and I had to call the show without a tech process like I have become accustomed to. All that said, the show came together beautifully, with the whole team working together through all the rehearsals, runs, and all the way through strike. I am grateful to have had this absolutely crazy whirlwind of an experience for everyone I got to work alongside with and for all the crazy things I learned through it.
